Get Talking

- 1. Have you ever had an experience or encounter that changed the way you saw things (e.g. becoming a parent, major health scare)? Share your stories.
- 2. Skim back over 1:1-10. What is the big issue that Paul wants to address in this letter?

READ Galatians 1:11-2:10

- 3. How does Paul defend the gospel the he has been preaching?
- 4. What are the implications if Paul did indeed receive his gospel by revelation from Jesus Christ (v11)?
- 5. Why does Paul spend so much time talking about his own story (you can also read an account in Acts 9:1-19)? What does he say about his past life?
- 6. Paul gives a lot of detail about his movements following the encounter with Jesus. Try to map this out. Why does he go into all this detail?

- 7. It seems as if the false teachers were accusing Paul of not being a real apostle and that his teaching wasn't in line with that of the original apostles. How does Paul counter this?
- 8. How does Paul show that even though he wasn't reliant on the original apostles for his message, his gospel wasn't different to theirs? Why is this important?
- 9. When Paul goes to Jerusalem for the second time, he takes Titus (and Barnabas) with him (see 2:1-5). How does Titus become an important figure in this controversy?
- 10. How would giving in to the demand for Titus to be circumcised "make us slaves" and jeopardise the "truth of the gospel" (2:3-5)?
- 11. For Paul, anything that is added to the "truth of the gospel" actually subtracts from it. If the false teachers wanted to *compel* people to be circumcised, Paul was *compelled* to object. Can you think of extra things that people want to add to the gospel today? How should we respond?
- 12. What is the key to a life-changing encounter God? Has that happened to you? What changes has he brought about in your life?

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
